

Animal Nutrition - Utilizing optimal nutrition to fight the obesity epidemic

Mirroring the epidemic in humans, currently 65% of our pets are overweight or obese. Obesity is a disease state that is associated with multiple disease conditions that can decrease quality of life, inflict emotional and financial burdens on pet owners, and ultimately shorten life span. Multiple factors have been identified that impact success or failure of weight management programs in the veterinary practice including spay/neuter status, appropriate diet selection, client support and follow up. Veterinarians might recommend "Just feed less" but this can result in pet owners inappropriately reducing foods not intended for weight management, potentially deficient nutrient intakes, hungry pets, and ultimately failure to successfully manage the pet's weight and body condition. Proactively identifying at risk pets for overweight/obesity, feeding appropriate diets and amounts, monitoring our patients carefully, troubleshooting the difficult cases and providing client support while leveraging our hospital support staff can help turn around this epidemic of obesity and improve the quality of life for our patients.
