Block That Pain! Pain Management and Anesthesia for the Dental Patient*

Pain management is more than the latest popular terminology. It is an important part of veterinary dentistry. Many of the procedures performed on animals are painful and it is our duty as technicians to ensure that our patients are as comfortable as possible. The delivery of local nerve blocks prior to performing many dental procedures or oral surgery is a great way to create preemptive analgesia. This can often be incorporated into a multimodal plan for pain control.

Advanced Dental Procedures

Oral disease is one of the most prevalent diseases in dogs and cats. 80% of adult dogs and 70% of adult cats have some form of oral disease. Unfortunately, that leads to the extraction of teeth that may have been saved. It is vital to offer the client the options to treatment via referral to veterinary dental specialist. Owners want what is in the best interest of their pets but may not be aware of alternative treatment options. Remember to never judge what your clients will be willing to do for their pets.

The Complete Plan for the Periodontal Patient - COHAT*

Performing a Complete Oral Health Assessment and Treatment (COHAT) entails much more than removing plaque and calculus from the teeth. A thorough dental prophylaxis consists of educating the client, an oral examination, charting disease process, pathology and anomalies, radiographs, both supra and sub-gingival plaque and calculus removal, hand scaling, polishing, irrigation and home care instructions.

Dental Radiology Made Easy- Tips and Tricks!*

Dental radiographs are an essential part of the oral exam. The crown is just the tip of the iceberg. Approximately 42% of dental pathology is found subgingivally. Radiographs will help diagnose pathology that is not visible from the surface, confirm suspect pathology as well as help demonstrate the pathology to the client. Dental radiographs can improve the standard of care in your practice and increase your clinic's revenue.

Basic Dental X-ray Interpretation*

Dental x-rays are an essential part of the oral exam. You are now taking diagnostic x-rays but what are you seeing? Learn how to properly position dental x-rays to be able identify the correct teeth. Is that dental pathology or a normal structure? The basics of canine and feline dental x-rays will be presented along with a series of "What is that?" slides to help better understand dental radiology.

The Oral Examination and Common Pathology*

It is important to be able to recognize and identify oral pathology and anomalies. The most commonly observed abnormalities will be discussed in this presentation. It is equally important to correctly record the pathology on dental charts. A thorough dental examination includes both conscious and anesthetized examinations as well as charting disease processes, pathology and anomalies, and treatment plans.

Gaining Dental Compliance – What Works!

As veterinary health professionals, it is our job not only to promote dentistry but to educate our clients about the importance of good oral health. How can we do this? Talk with them about the importance of good oral care by expressing the fact that the mouth is a mirror to the body. Start this education process with your clients at the first puppy or kitten visit and continue at every visit throughout the pet's lifetime. Explain that the mouth is a mirror to the body. Methods to promote the importance of oral health will be discussed.
